

Precedent is permanent. Your research process should not be.

Agentic AI for contract review, research, and compliance.
Without ethical compromise.

Document review used to be the price of doing the work. It does not have to be.

Contracts pile up at quarter-end. Research consumes the hours that should belong to strategy. Compliance shifts under teams that cannot read every advisory the day it ships. Agentic AI is the first technology that handles review as a workflow, not a moment. Autonomously triaging, redlining, and flagging, with the partner of record always in the loop.

Why this matters now

Associates do not disappear. They show up to the meeting with the answer, not the search results. An AI Officer in legal designs the boundary between agent draft and attorney work product. And writes it into the policy before a regulator does it for you.

Your associates billed 1,840 hours each on document review last year. What did partner-track attrition cost you?

AI in legal work is regulated as professional conduct. The bar association is the regulator.

Beyond the six global regimes, legal & professional services carries the overlays below. Each one has its own enforcement model and its own evidence expectation.

Bar AI Ethics ABA Model Rule 1.1 + State Bar AI Ethics UNITED STATES, STATE BARS

Opinions

CRITICAL

Applies to. Any lawyer using AI in client work. Multiple state bars have issued opinions (FL, CA, NY, NJ, DC).

Key obligation. Competence with technology including AI. Confidentiality of client data. Supervision of AI output. Reasonable fees with AI efficiency gains.

Evidence. AI use disclosure to clients, supervision records, billing rationale.

Court AI Rules Federal + State Court AI Disclosure Rules UNITED STATES, COURTS

HIGH

Applies to. AI-assisted filings in courts that require disclosure (an expanding list including 5th Circuit, multiple federal district courts).

Key obligation. Disclose AI use in filings where required. Verify factual accuracy and citations. Sanctions for hallucinated citations.

Evidence. AI disclosure statements, citation verification records, supervision documentation.

AI + Privilege Attorney-Client Privilege + AI Data UNITED STATES, COMMON LAW

Handling

HIGH

Applies to. AI vendors processing privileged communications.

Key obligation. Preserve privilege through AI processing. Enterprise tenancy, no training on client data, deletion controls.

Evidence. Vendor agreements, technical architecture documentation, privilege protocol.

Applies to. Audit, consulting, and advisory firms using AI in client deliverables.

Key obligation. Independence considerations for AI-assisted audits. PCAOB scrutiny of AI in audit procedures.

Evidence. Independence assessments, AI methodology documentation, work paper traceability.

What we will not do.

We do not practice law, supervise associates, or sit in privilege review. We do not deploy agents on matters where the work product would be unrecoverable if the agent's draft survived to client without partner edit. We pass on firms where the managing partner sees AI as a procurement decision delegated to IT, because that posture will not survive the first malpractice claim.

Five things managing partners need to hear about AI.

Five cited insights for the next risk-committee meeting. Each one is sourced. Each one is what an experienced AI Officer would put in front of the board if they walked in tomorrow.

01 · THE DUTY

Model Rule 1.1 Comment 8 makes AI competence a professional duty.

More than 40 state bars have adopted the technology-competence comment. Florida Bar Ethics Opinion 24-1, the California Bar guidance from November 2023, and ABA Formal Opinion 512 (July 2024) all extend the duty to understand what an AI tool does and does not do. Ignoring the tool is now sanctionable, not safe.

02 · THE SANCTION

Mata v. Avianca turned hallucination into a sanctionable event.

Judge Castel's June 2023 sanctions order in *Mata v. Avianca* made clear that submitting unverified AI-generated authority is sanctionable conduct. Subsequent cases in Texas, Colorado, and DC have followed. The bar is rising fast and the carriers are watching.

03 · THE TIME RECOVERED

Time savings are real and they break the billable hour.

Thomson Reuters' 2024 Future of Professionals report finds 87 percent of legal professionals saying generative AI is changing their work. Time savings of 4 to 12 hours per week per professional are commonly reported on document-heavy practices. The math no longer favors hour-based billing for that work.

04 · THE ECONOMIC SHIFT

Billable-hour economics are under structural pressure.

Big Four legal investments and Allen and Overy's enterprise deployment of Harvey reframed the conversation. Wolters Kluwer's 2024 Future Ready Lawyer survey shows clients increasingly refuse to pay for hours that an agent could compress. Firms that hold the line on the old model are losing the work.

05 · THE PRIVILEGE QUESTION

Privilege analysis on third-party AI is not yet settled.

Most commercial AI vendors offer zero-retention enterprise tiers. The privilege analysis on agent-mediated communications, however, is still being litigated. ABA Formal Opinion 512 and NYC Bar Formal Opinion 2024-5 set the early line: the GC needs to architect the privilege boundary before deployment, not after.

The Privilege-Aware Agent Stack.

Every legal-services agent answers to four questions. Who saw the data, who trained on it, who can subpoena the trail, and who signs the final work product. Architect the answers before deployment.

QUESTION 1

Vendor architecture

Data residency and zero-retention attestation written into the contract.

QUESTION 2

Privilege segregation

Privileged matters run in scoped agent environments with separate retention.

QUESTION 3

Discoverability

Map what an agent log will look like in production. Document privilege ahead.

QUESTION 4

Signed artifact

Attorney work product is the signed deliverable. Never the agent's draft.

Frequently asked questions.

How do you protect privileged information?

Privileged data stays inside boundaries we define with your GC. Agents working on privileged matters run in segregated environments with their own retention rules. Nothing leaks to a model that was not allowed to see it in the first place.

Will associates lose training opportunities?

Only if you let them. The firms doing this well are pairing agents with associates and using the freed capacity for the higher-judgment work. Argument practice, client interaction, complex negotiation. The pipeline gets stronger, not thinner.

What about the unauthorized practice of law?

Agents draft and analyze. Lawyers practice. We design every workflow so the agent's output is a draft awaiting attorney review, never a final position issued to a client.
